YouCan Community Club provides a wide range of sports, musical and arts opportunities for young people aged 10-25 who have physical and/or mental disabilities, young people who live in care and any young person who feels socially isolated. Their work during 2017/18 was supported by a £15,000 Impact Fund grant.



Salford Clinical Commissioning Group



New Beginnings

This group run by a group of volunteers who provide safe places for people who live with depression, feel socially isolated, carers or even for people that just want somewhere to go to feel welcomed. Support from the **Volunteers Expenses Fund** covered travel and lunch costs for their team of volunteers.

Salford Survivor Project

This community group provides a service for people that are at present or have in the past been in an abusive or violent relationship. They provide non-judgmental assistance for people within Salford to gain information, help and support. The **Volunteers Expenses Fund** covered DBS checks, travel and refreshments.



Salford Death Café

A Little Pot of Health **Wellbeing** grant covered the set-up and promotion costs for the provision of non-clinical support and sign-posting to people with terminal illness and/or people living with life limiting conditions & their families. In 2017 the group won a Forever Manchester award for their work.





Salford Heart Care

The group aims to prevent heart disease and heart attacks, reduce social isolation, improve health and wellbeing, provide aftercare for people with heart conditions and long-term illnesses, and reduce the risk of further heart attacks. A wellbeing grant enabled new dance and exercise sessions at their Healthy Heart Clubs based in Irlam and Eccles.

Alberts of Salford are delivering sports, dance and youth club activities for young people in Broughton 3-nights-a-week thanks to an **Impact Fund Grant**.



Incredible Education's volunteers benefitted from uniforms, protective equipment work and cost-free travel due to support received from the Volunteers Expenses Fund.

Little Pot of Health

1) Impact Fund - Partnership Challenge

What is the Impact Fund Partnership Challenge?

The Little Pot of Health Impact Partnerships Challenge Fund is aimed at VCSE organisations operating in Salford. Partnerships can bid for up to £50,000 p.a. (£150,000 over 3 years) to deliver a three-year project.

Criteria specific to the Impact Fund Partnership Challenge

- Project is delivered by a partnership of VCSE organisations with one VCSE organisation acting as the lead, plus up to 2 additional partners.
- Must be able to match at least 50% with new funding (e.g. not from reserves or in-kind contributions)
- Demonstrate that the project will lead to community resilience through delivery of key outcomes from Salford's Locality Plan (Start Well, Live Well, Age Well); and adopts a prevention and early intervention approach.
- Also partnerships must demonstrate the added social value that the project will make to Salford residents, including direct contribution towards Salford's 10% Better campaign.

In 2017 three projects were awarded funding, two under the 'Start Well' theme and one under the 'Live Well' theme. These successful partnership applications are featured overleaf.

As no bids were received under the 'Age Well' theme a dedicated round was launched in early 2018. The grants panel for this will meet in mid-May 2018.



Greater Manchester Youth Network were able to provide match from an Esme Fairburn grant in their successful bid for Impact Fund - Partnership Challenge funding.

Their **Salford Boom** project will provide an engagement, support and development package for looked after children and care experienced children throughout Salford, building on programmes delivered elsewhere in the city region.

Little Pot of Health

2) Impact Fund

The Little Pot of Health Impact Fund is aimed at VCSE organisations operating in Salford. Grants of up to £15,000 are available to organisations who are able to convince a panel that they can effectively deliver measurable outcomes against the wellbeing and health priorities identified in the Locality Plan: Start Well, Live Well, Age Well.

Successful applicants will need to use a specified outcomes measurement tool as part of their grant agreement and work with Salford CVS to ensure they are able to demonstrate the impact of their project.

The Grants Panel met on 8th December 2017 and awarded grants to 14 VCSE organisations totaling £205,465.62. The underspend of £44,534.38 has enabled the cross-subsidy of the Impact Fund Partnership Challenge 'Age Well' theme in Q4.

Social Sense CIC are utilising their **Impact Fund** grant to provide training for school and CVSE organisation staff to delivered embedded mental health and emotional support to young people. During 2018 the project involve direct work with young people at 13 schools and make use of their 'Mindful Me' app.

Lifecentre Salford launched their 'Buggy Movers' project with support from an **Impact Fund** grant. The award covered the cost of eight buggies and trainer time to deliver weekly sessions from three locations in Salford.

3) Wellbeing Fund

What is the Little Pot of Health Wellbeing Fund?

The Little Pot of Health Wellbeing Fund is a small grants pot of up to £1,000 aimed at small third sector organisations in Salford. Groups can apply to deliver activities that help improve the wider wellbeing of Salford residents

The Grants Panel met on 7th September 2017 and awarded grants to 11 VCSE organisations. Total grants awarded = £10,365. At the time of writing a further 7 bids are due to be assessed in early 2018. A further round is planned for Q4 together. Options are also being considered for streamlining the application process and including groups pitching to a 'dragon's den' style assessment panel. Any residual grant monies not awarded will be earmarked for reallocation/roll-forward as appropriate.

4) Volunteers' Expenses Fund

What is the Volunteers' Expenses Fund?

The Volunteers' Expenses Fund is a fund that Salford-based 'small' voluntary and community groups (annual income below £100,000) can apply to for up to £750 in order to meet the cost of paying out volunteer expenses. This is an ongoing fund.

Volunteering is any activity that involves spending time, unpaid, and of their own choice, doing something that aims to benefit the environment or someone (individuals or groups) other than, or in addition to, close relatives.

As a result of reduced funding, growing numbers of volunteer-involving organisations are finding themselves unable to provide volunteer expenses, which in turn can prevent some people from being able to afford to participate in volunteering activities.

This Volunteers' Expenses Fund is designed to make volunteering more accessible to a wide range of local people.

Organisations can apply for funding for any of the following expenses:

- Cost of protective clothing / specialist equipment
- Meals taken whilst volunteering
- Care of dependants during volunteering (limited to £15 per day)
- DBS (CRB) checks for volunteers (as appropriate)
- Travel to and from the place of volunteering

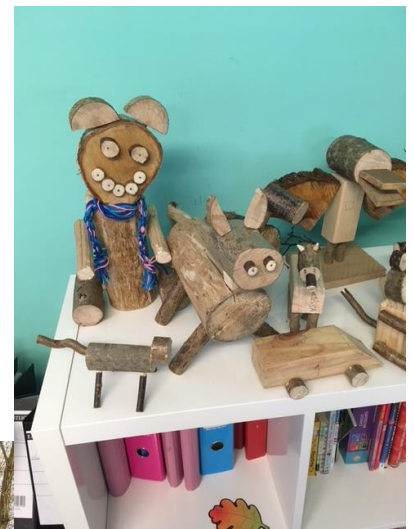

6) Healthy Schools Fund - Community Partnership Challenge

What is the Healthy Schools Community Partnership Challenge?

The LPOH Healthy Schools 'Community Partnership Challenge' is designed to develop partnerships between schools and VCSE organisations in Salford. These new partnerships will work to engage families and communities in the life of schools and support the development of community assets that improve the health and wider wellbeing of Salford's children.

Partnerships between schools / or schools and VCSE organisations can bid for up to £15,000 to deliver activities which:

- Increases the number of community assets operating in partnership with primary schools
- Improves the health and wider wellbeing of children in Salford
- Improves the mental and emotional wellbeing of children in Salford
- Increases the numbers of children in Salford taking part in health & wellbeing activities
- Increases the confidence of children in Salford
- Increases family engagement in the life of the school
