## Introduction

At Salford CVS we passionately believe in the strategic power of small grants programmes that enable local VCSE groups and organisations to make positive wellbeing and health interventions, in line with the priorities articulated in the Salford Locality Plan, within the communities in which they operate (by geography, identity and theme). We would go as far to state that local community groups, voluntary organisations, charities and social enterprises can provide reach into communities that the public sector would always struggle to achieve.

Salford CVS established the Third Sector Fund in 2014 in partnership with NHS Salford CCG (the funder) to harness Salford CVS' relationship with the voluntary, community and social enterprise sector in Salford in order to reach into these local communities. The Fund ran in 2014-15 and again in 2015-16. Upon production of an independent evaluation (CLES / VSNW) of the value of this funding and its impact on local communities, the CCG then agreed, based on one of the evaluation report's key recommendations, a further three-year investment for the period 2017-2020.

In 2017, Salford CVS re-appointed CLES (Centre for Local Economic Strategies) and VSNW (Voluntary Sector North-West) as independent evaluation partners to undertake annual assessments of the impact of the Third Sector Fund during the period 2017-2020. This built upon the work CLES / VSNW undertook in their evaluation of the Third Sector Fund 2014-16.

The CLES / VSNW independent evaluation report of the funding year 2017/18 identified that for every £1 invested through the Third Sector Fund, a Social Return on Investment (SROI) of £29.98 was generated. In their evaluation of the year 2018/19, they further determined a Financial Return on Investment (FROI) of £17.74, stating, *"This represents an exceptionally strong return on investment for health-related outcomes and demonstrates the clear benefits of the CCG's approach to addressing the city's health outcomes by investing in the VCSE sector."*

The 2018/19 evaluation findings were launched at a large celebration / learning event at The Lowry Theatre in September 2019. This included a presentation of the findings by Neil McInroy, CEO of CLES and a keynote speech from Anthony Hassall, Chief Accountable Officer of NHS Salford CCG. Steve Dixon, (then Director of Finance, now CAO) also attended the event alongside other members of the CCG's Executive Team; Stephen Woods, the CCG's VCSE commissioner; members and offices from the local authority; and many of the VCSE groups and organisations that had been funded via the Third Sector Fund. The event featured demonstrations, films, talks, etc. by VCSE groups / organisations alongside an 'Impact Garden'. Salford CVS would like to thank NHS Salford CCG for their continued support for us and our sector, and the recognition you have given our role as a key strategic partner and a key delivery partner in wellbeing, health and care in Salford.

Your agreement to invest a further £1 million p.a. for the next 5 years (April 2020 – March 2025) will make a huge difference to the wellbeing and health of communities of geography, identity and experience across Salford and help the city move towards its ambition to become a Marmot City.

The refresh of the Salford Locality Plan places neighbourhoods and communities at the heart of our collective endeavours as a wellbeing, health and care system; and I am proud that Salford CVS and the wider VCSE sector continue to be recognised for the important roles we play.

The arrival of the Covid-19 pandemic, with the early evidence demonstrating that the impact of the virus is exacerbating health and economic inequalities, reminds me of our collective challenges in Salford. The Third Sector Fund grants programme is already proving a crucial element of our city's Covid-19 response.

We look forward to working with our CCG colleagues in the forthcoming years for the benefit of the people of Salford.

## Evaluation of the Third Sector Fund 2018/19 - reported in 2019

### Demonstrating the Impact of the Third Sector Fund

The Centre for Local Economic Strategies (CLES) and Voluntary Sector North-West (VSNW) undertook an independent evaluation of the impact of the Third Sector Fund for 2018/19 and also reviewed data for all years of the fund's existence. Read the [summary](#) or [full report](#).

Looking across the four years CLES calculated that for every £1 invested by the CCG a social return of **£14.94** has been delivered. To put this figure in context, comparable projects of the type funded through the grants programme are considered to be offering excellent value for money if they generate a social return on investment above £5 for every £1 invested.

### New data - new insights for 2018/19

Up until now, CLES has worked to develop these return on investment figures using case study data from a sample of groups who have received funding in each grant cycle. This year, we were able to run this methodology alongside a newly developed 'distance travelled' methodology due to the dedicated capacity within Salford CVS and grant recipients to capturing the impact of grants.

CLES used this 'distance travelled' information from across grant pots to calculate the financial value of the impact our grants have had on people's lives - this has given us a figure for 2018/19 of: **£1 : £17.74**. This data set provides a highly robust measure of the impact of this year's programme.

### Salford Stories

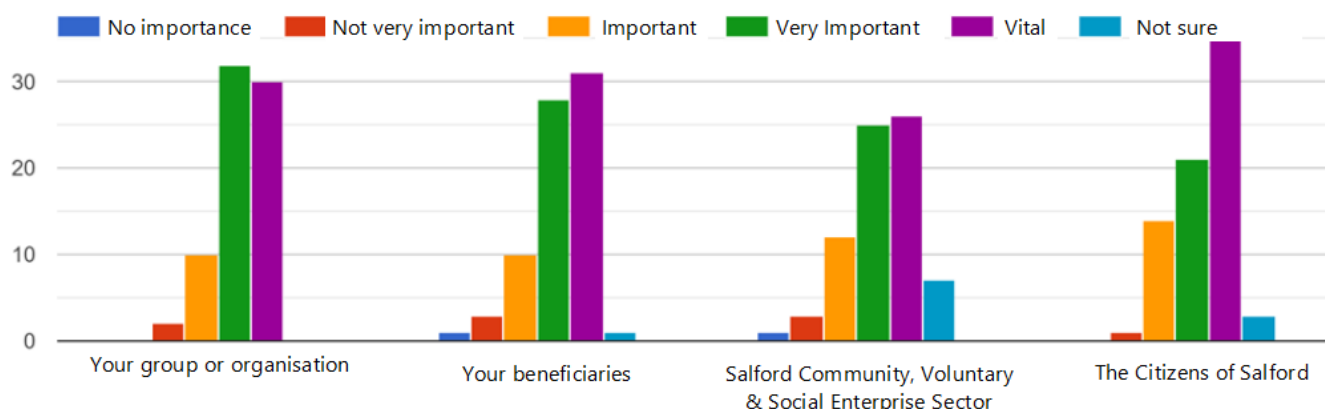

Clearly, the sector greatly values the grants made available through Salford CVS alongside the wrap-around development support and financial support services that we provide. ## Strategy and Policy Development

The main aim of the *Third Sector Fund* is to enable Salford CVS to use their position in the city to reach voluntary organisations, community groups and social enterprises in all parts of the city (by neighbourhood and also in terms of communities of identity) that, with a small investment, could help address some of the key health priorities in Salford, as articulated in the Salford Locality Plan:

- **START WELL:** Ensure all children have the best start in life and continue to develop well during their early years
- **LIVE WELL:** Local residents achieve and maintain a sense of wellbeing by leading a healthy lifestyle supported by resilient communities
- **AGE WELL:** All local residents can access quality health and social care and use it appropriately

During the year 2019/20 we continued to deliver the recommendations of the previous large-scale Third Sector Fund grants evaluation report (CLES / VSNW), which were as follows:

**Recommendation 1** – Roll out the Programme over 3 years with an annual fund of £1 million. A three-year programme enables sustainability for voluntary and community sector organisations.

**Recommendation 2** – Acknowledge the key role of Salford CVS. Salford CVS were identified for the competency of managing the design and delivery of the programme and also in strategically developing the capacity of the VCSE sector in Salford.

**Recommendation 3** – Recognise the importance of grant making for the VCSE sector, particularly developing the skills of small organisations delivering outputs and outcomes around health & wellbeing and in achieving value for money.

**Recommendation 4** – Develop a more effective means of monitoring and evaluating the Grants Programme, with monitoring and evaluation built in from the onset.

**Recommendation 5** – Embed wider understanding of the value of grants by disseminating the findings of the evaluation widely across place-based organisations in Salford and wider Greater Manchester, including Salford City Council and those engaging with the Health and Social Care devolution agenda.

**Recommendation 6** – Join up the programme to other agendas. Align the agendas and priorities of the grants more closely with the objectives and evidence detailed in the Locality Plan, the activities of Salford City Council and other health and social care providers.

**Recommendation 7** – Ramp up the voluntary and community sector. Develop a coordinated voluntary, community and social enterprise sector strategy with the sector, NHS Salford CCG and Salford City Council.

**Recommendation 8** – Promote the values of Programme across Greater Manchester. To promote the findings of the evaluation and the effectiveness of the programme to the Greater Manchester devolution agenda.

## Significant achievements in the year 2019/20 have included:

- ✓ This year represents the final year of a three-year programme. It has continued to mature and evolve, informed by our funders, strategic partners (public and VCSE), grants recipients and beneficiaries. The flexibility of the funding arrangement with NHS Salford CCG has enabled Salford CVS to swiftly respond to emerging city-wide priorities. This is exemplified by the pre-lockdown launch of the Covid-19 Crisis Fund in the final weeks of the financial year;
- ✓ The Third Sector Fund continues to be supported and shaped by Salford CVS' whole-team approach. In addition to the funding offer, organisations in our sector benefit from a comprehensive package of strategic voice and influence, organisational development support, brokering of volunteer opportunities, DBS checks and back-office support (including book-keeping and holding accounts);
- ✓ Salford CVS continues to apply the best practice principles described in the national 'Grants for Good' approach: [Directory of Social Change - Grants for Good Campaign \(dsc.org.uk\)](https://www.dsc.org.uk/);
- ✓ We have utilised the skills and experience of representatives from our sector on grants panels; this includes a youth-led panel on our Youth Wellbeing Fund;
- ✓ The additional capacity provided by our Impact Evaluation Worker (funded by the Third Sector Fund) has helped us tell multiple 'Salford Stories', culminating in a major event at the Lowry showcase the positive impact that grants can make on the lives of local people;
- ✓ We continued to spend significant time both within Salford and at GM strategic level during 2019/20 to lobby for and evidence the role, benefits and impact of using grants as a tool for investment into VCSE organisations and the communities they serve. For instance, we played a key role in the development of the GM VCSE Commissioning Framework and Delivery Plan, which has been adopted by the GM Health and Social Care Partnership. - ✓ We have also helped the public sector in Salford and across GM recognise the value grants can play in responding swiftly to the challenges of Covid;
- ✓ We continued to play a key strategic role across agendas in Salford during 2019/20, ensuring our grants programmes help to deliver Locality Plan priorities whilst also responding to wider agendas such as tackling food poverty and addressing inequalities;
- ✓ During 2019/20 Salford CVS played a key role in the refreshing of the Salford Locality Plan, with a key focus emerging around the importance of neighbourhoods and communities;
- ✓ Salford CVS continued to deliver the ambitions of the Salford CVS Strategy and the MoU with Salford Together during 2019/20.



**Plans for 2020/21 include:**

- Ensuring the Third Sector Fund aligns to the newly refreshed Locality Plan for Salford and ambitions for Salford to become a Marmot City;
- Capturing which VCSE organisations funded pay the real Living Wage (as per the national Living Wage Foundation); encouraging VCSE organisations to pay the RLW and become accredited; and playing a key role in Salford's Living Wage City action group;
- Continuing to deliver the action plan for the MoU between the VCSE sector and Salford Together health and social care partners;
- Continuing to deliver the action plan aligned with Salford's VCSE Strategy 2018-2023;
- Focusing our energy and resources on helping the city tackle the multiple impacts of the Covid-19 pandemic.

## Responsiveness Fund

This fund of c. £50,000 p.a. was originally established to be responsive and support priorities that emerge during the year. If it wasn't spent, then the agreement between CVS and the CCG is for any allocations remaining to be carried forward. This year an allocation from 2018/19 was brought forward as planned, making £130,000 available in 2019/20. This has been allocated, by agreement with our CCG commissioner Stephen Woods, to the following priorities:

- £15,000 – Grow Well Fund (matched by £15,000 from the RHS nationally) to support new or expand existing community growing projects which promote wellbeing (working with RHS Bridgewater).
- £50,000 – Young People – a Youth Wellbeing Fund targeting young people that are supported by a VCSE organisation. Grants of up to £2,500 to be awarded over two funding rounds.
- £25,000 - Living Well With Dementia – 4 projects were selected for support in consultation with the CCG commissioner Paul Walsh and the Salford Dementia Alliance, with awards being made in Q1 of 2019/20.
- £25,000 – Healthy Holidays Fund – Supporting the provision of activities and a healthy meal for children during summer 2019. Delivered in partnership with the CCG, Salford Council and the VCSE-led Salford Foodshare Network.
- £10,000 was allocated to a Food Poverty Fund, awarding a single grant to Salford Foodbank.
- Any remaining funds were rolled forward for allocation in 2010/21.

## New in 2019/20

### Impact Fund for Social Prescribing

The architecture to deliver social prescribing (via the city's VCSE-led Wellbeing Matters programme) across Salford's five health neighbourhoods has been refined as the programme has matured during 2019/20. £125k (+£170k rolled-forward from 2018/19) of Third Sector Fund monies has been allocated to directly support VCSE organisations in each of the 5 neighbourhoods to help build the wider community ecosystem in order to support effective social prescribing. Awards have been made through the year with further rounds expected in the coming months.

These funds were divided into two elements:

- £45k for a Micro-Grant Fund – awarding grants of up to £500 to help seed the 'micro' social prescribing ecosystem
- £250k for the Neighbourhood Impact Fund – awarding grants of up to £5,000 for larger VCSE neighborhood projects that directly support the Wellbeing Matters social prescribing programme

### An ever-growing grants programme

Salford CVS' proven track record of managing grants programmes has attracted a growing number of grant givers wishing to outsource existing, or commence new grant schemes.

New and continuing grant and investments schemes for 2019/20 and beyond include:

- Emotional Wellbeing and Mental Health Grants - £331,000 has been secured p.a. during the period 2018-21 (GM mental health transformation funding to Salford) to support large (up to £50k) and small (up to £10k) projects that address mental health priorities aligned with the Living Well model.
- The Achieve (Bolton, Salford, Trafford) Recovery Asset Fund (commissioned via GM Mental Health Trust). Salford CVS has been appointed to design and manage the £170k p.a. of small grants to community groups during the period 2018-23 to promote drug and alcohol recovery across Bolton, Salford and Trafford.
- Salford CVS is one of partners in the city's Local Delivery Pilot, funded by Sport England, to increase physical activity rates. Salford's chosen target demographic is girls and young women aged 5-18 in out-of-school settings. In addition to a 0.6 FTE Development Worker post, Salford CVS is managing a £50k per annum investment fund to support VCSE organisations to reach those girls and young women who are least engaged in physical activity.
- The History Makers programme is a Greater Manchester Health and Social Care Partnership engagement programme to support smoking cessation across all of the 10 local authority areas in GM. During 2019 - 2021 around £50,000 is being invested in VCSE organisations across GM through a fund administered by Salford CVS.
- For 2019/20 the RHS has once again committed £15k (to match with Third Sector Fund Responsiveness monies) to deliver a grants round to encourage growing activities throughout Salford.
- Salford CVS is once again managing a fund on behalf of Salford City Council for activities that support Hate Crime Awareness Week 2020; and also a Short Break Care Fund for children with disabilities.
- The £2.1m Answer Cancer: VCSE-led Cancer Screening Engagement programme for Greater Manchester (2019 – 2023) is led by Salford CVS and has an accompanying investments programme of £100,000 per annum.

### Beech Court TARA

A £1,000 grant funded the 'Ages of Salford' project. It brought together older residents in a journey of discovery - exploring the history of Salford.

## Youth Wellbeing Fund

Fulfilling a commitment made at a previous Seldom Heard event for young people, Salford CVS awarded a range of grants to youth-led projects in July 2019. A second round of the Youth Wellbeing Fund was launched at the Seldom Heard event in November 2019. Over the two rounds, the youth-led panel awarded a total of £46,597.93 to 22 projects to support the wellbeing of young people.

## Living Well with Dementia

£25,000 of the Responsive Fund was allocated to Age UK Salford, Warm Hut, Dementia Havens and Singing with Dementia to support a programme of activity focused on assisting those with dementia, their carers and wider family.

## St Mary's RC Primary School, Eccles

A £5,000 Healthy Schools grant funded the creation of a multipurpose sensory garden for use by all of the school community.

This garden features sensory areas to provide calm and relaxation. The growing of plants, fruits and vegetables also provide valuable skills to the children.





## **Hershel Weiss Children and Family Centre**

A £4,271 Healthy Holidays grant provided 728 meals over 12 days of summer 2019 to children aged 5-16.

## **Albert Park Running Group**

The establishment of this group was supported by Salford CVS who teamed them up with GMCR Runners to learn from hard-won experience.

A £500 Microgrant got them up and running, followed by a £1,000 Wellbeing grant to establish a well-attended Couch to 5k programme.



## **Women with Wings CIC**

In July 2019 the Women With Wings CIC was awarded a £1,000 Wellbeing grant to develop and promote awareness of gender based violence (GBV) within Black, Asian and minority ethnic community, empower women to report cases of GBV.

In November 2019 the group received a £5,000 Neighbourhood Impact Fund grant to support social prescribing. The project focused on raising awareness of the benefits regarding cooking and eating health food to prevent and reduce obesity, diabetic and heart diseases.

## APPENDIX 1 - Summary of awarded grants by Fund 2019/20

### 1) Impact Fund - Partnership Challenge

The Impact Fund Partnership Challenge was aimed at VCSE organisations operating in Salford. Partnerships can bid for up to £50,000 per year for up to 3 years.

#### Criteria specific to the Impact Fund Partnership Challenge

- Project is delivered by a partnership of VCSE organisations with one VCSE organisation acting as the lead, plus up to 2 additional partners.
- Must be able to match at least 50% with new funding.
- Demonstrate that the project will lead to community resilience through delivery of key outcomes from Salford's Locality Plan (Start Well, Live Well, Age Well); and adopts a prevention and early intervention approach.
- Also partnerships must demonstrate the added social value that the project will make to Salford residents, including direct contribution towards Salford's *10% Better* campaign.

In 2017/18 three projects were awarded funding, two under the 'Start Well' theme and one under the 'Live Well' theme. A dedicated 'Age Well' round was held in Q1 of 2018/19.

All funded projects are outlined below and feature their award for 2019/20.

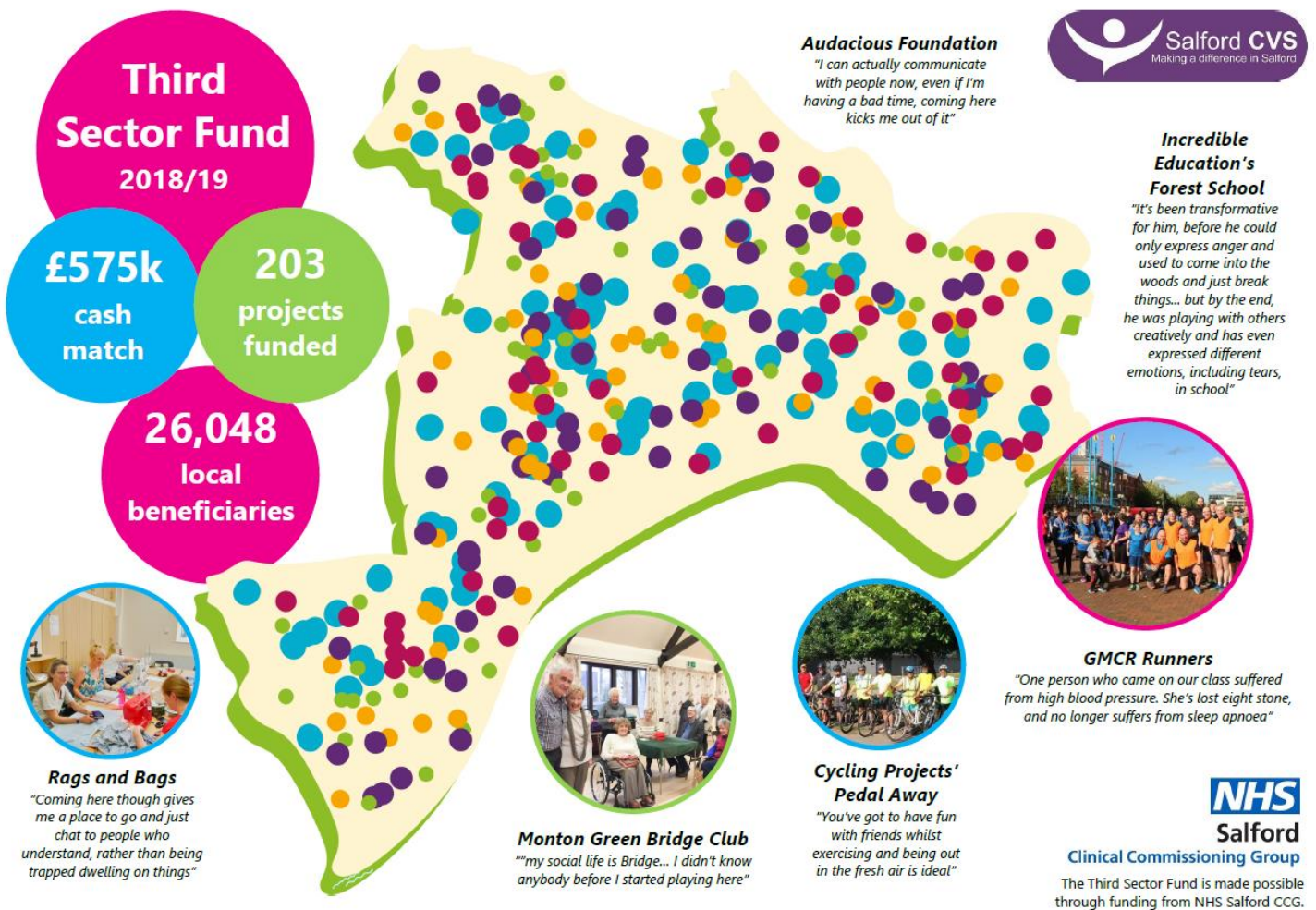

The Wellbeing Fund is a small grants pot of up to £1,000 aimed at small VCSE organisations in Salford. Organisations can apply to deliver activities that help improve the wider wellbeing of Salford residents, demonstrating how their activities meet at least one of the [Five Ways to Wellbeing](#).

To solicit bids from new groups and those from under-represented equalities groups the second round's application process was simplified to a 2-page form followed by a 3-minute pitch to grants panel. This built on successful trialing of this model in 2018/19.

## 7) Volunteers' Expenses Fund

### What is the Volunteers' Expenses Fund?

The Volunteers' Expenses Fund is a fund that Salford-based 'small' voluntary and community groups (annual income below £100,000) can apply to for up to £750 in order to meet the cost of paying out volunteer expenses. This is an ongoing fund.

Volunteering is any activity that involves spending time, unpaid, and of their own choice, doing something that aims to benefit the environment or someone (individuals or groups) other than, or in addition to, close relatives.



As a result of reduced funding, growing numbers of volunteer-involving organisations are finding themselves unable to provide volunteer expenses, which in turn can prevent some people from being able to afford to participate in volunteering activities.

This Volunteers' Expenses Fund is designed to make volunteering more accessible to a wide range of local people.

**Groups / organisations can apply for funding for any of the following expenses:**

- Cost of protective clothing / specialist equipment
- Meals taken whilst volunteering (out of pocket)
- Care of dependents during volunteering (limited to £15 per day)
- DBS (CRB) checks for volunteers (as appropriate)
- Travel to and from the place of volunteering (out of pocket)

## 11.1) RESPONSIVE FUND - Grow Well Fund

## 11.2) RESPONSIVE FUND – Youth Wellbeing Fund

In response to a pledge the CCG's children's commissioner made at a Seldom Heard young people's event in 2018, Salford CVS and NHS Salford CCG established the Youth Wellbeing Fund. This invited submissions for youth-led projects hosted by either a school or college or VCSE organisations up to a value of £2,500.

Over two rounds of funding, panels involving youth representatives received pitches from young people and their 'host' VCSE organisation, resulting in the funding of 22 projects worth £46,597.93

Ongoing development support from Salford CVS forms part of the support package being offered by city partners to Freedom Central.

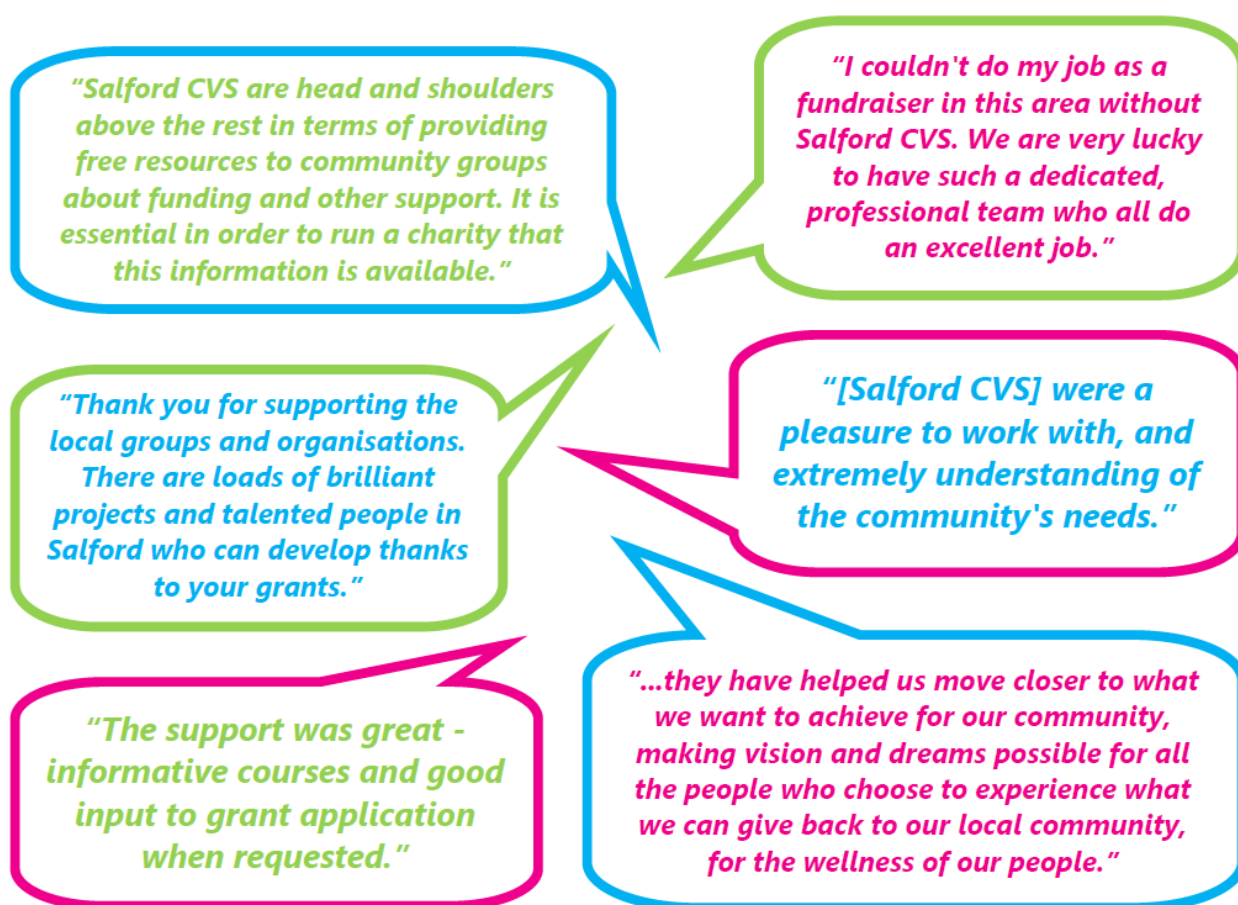
