

Alison is proud to have been the Chief Executive of Salford CVS since April 2013 and is passionate about Salford and working in partnership with the city's voluntary organisations, community groups, charities, social enterprises and other strategic partners in order to benefit local people and place.



Alison is involved in work around tackling poverty, reducing inequalities, promoting equity and creating an inclusive economy in both the city of Salford and across Greater Manchester. She's heavily involved in the changes around health and social care in Greater Manchester, including helping develop an Alternative Provider Collaborative for the social sector. In Salford she is a member of the Locality Board for Health and Care, The Provider Collaborative Board, and the Health & Wellbeing Board, and in Greater Manchester she sits on the NHS GM Partnership Board.

Alison is a founder Director of 10GM, a joint venture between some of Greater Manchester's locality infrastructure organisations; and a founder member of the Greater Manchester VCSE Leadership Group, where she co-chairs the VCSE Commissioning Group. Alison is also the Chair of the Salford Social Value Alliance and one of the organisers of Salford Social Enterprise City.

When she's not working (which is rare!) she enjoys getting as near to the sea as possible and hobbling around; watching football; talking politics; and practical volunteering such as gardening, growing, mentoring and campaigning!

She led on the co-production of the world's first community climate action plan by and for Disabled people, co-authored Bristol's Just Transition Declaration, is Bristol Climate & Nature Partnership's Climate and Disability associate, and is an advisor on the Sensing Climate research project.

She currently chairs Incredible Edible CIC, an international initiative begun in Northern England using the Trojan horse of local food growing to demonstrate the power of small actions in bringing about major cultural shifts. Previously as Leader of a Local Authority, Chair of an Acute Health Trust, board member of several national environmental bodies, Chair of the Board of the Forestry Commission GB, Yorkshire representative on the Committee of the Regions in Europe and currently Chair of a Town Deal board she has had a front row seat on how government at all levels operates and invests.



lan has a wealth of experience of teaching in the further education sector. He started his teaching career in 1999 where he first taught students with additional needs. His passion for using horticulture as a medium for teaching was fostered during this time.



In 2013 his outstanding work and dedication to the delivery of horticulture was recognised when he was awarded a Livery Company Prize from the Worshipful Company of Gardeners at the City & Guilds Annual Awards presented by HRH The Princess Royal at Buckingham Palace. In 2013 he founded the Incredible Edible Salford group, and in 2014 launched Incredible Education CIC, a Salford based health and wellbeing social enterprise working with local schools and organistions to provide education and wellbeing sessions through horticulture and Forest School sessions.

He retired from Incredible Education in July 2024, working part-time as a freelance Green/Community Space and Social Enterprise Consultant but continues to support the new management team at Incredible Education as they further develop Cleavley Community Forest Garden into an outstanding community asset.
