<p><b>Aims/priorities:</b></p>	<p>The funding aims to encourage the study and appreciation of the arts and sciences and to promote education, with a particular interest in activity in the North West of England, including Cheshire, Greater Manchester, Lancashire, Merseyside and Cumbria.</p> <p>The Foundation's aims and objectives are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Encouraging and promoting the study, practice and appreciation of the fine arts and the methods and means of their dissemination.</li> <li>• Encouraging and promoting the study and application of the sciences.</li> <li>• Promoting and advancing education.</li> <li>• Providing or assisting in the provision of facilities for recreation or other leisure-time occupation in the interests of social welfare.</li> </ul>
<p><b>Who can apply?</b></p>	<p>Organisations in the North West of England are eligible to apply. Preference will be given to organisations with charitable status but the Foundation occasionally considers applications from not-for-profit organisations.</p>
<p><b>Grant amount:</b></p>	<p>Grants of between £500 and £10,000 are available.</p> <p>Currently, the average grant awarded is £2,000, Larger grants can be awarded if the project is felt to be particularly innovative and imaginative and have a strong artistic or scientific content. The Foundation is unlikely to award 100% of funding unless there are exceptional circumstances.</p>

<p><b>Aims/priorities:</b></p>	<p>The Trust makes grants principally in two sectors: Music and Heritage &amp; Crafts. The Trust supports classical music performance and training especially chamber music, composition and music education. Particular interests within music education are music for children and adults with special needs, youth orchestras and projects at secondary and higher levels, including academic research.</p>
<p><b>Who can apply?</b></p>	<p>Charities, not-for-profit or Exempt organisations that are based in the UK are eligible to apply.</p>
<p><b>Grant amount:</b></p>	<p>Grants are generally in the region of £2,500 to £7,500.</p>

<p><b>Who can apply?</b></p>	<p>Projects taking place in or out of school, college or university, or in community settings in the UK will be considered.</p>
<p><b>Grant amount:</b></p>	<p>This is a highly competitive fund with only one in nine applications being successful last year.</p> <p>Grants of between £500 and £3,000 are available. The average grant is around £2,000.</p> <p>Grants will be made on a one-off basis. Award of a grant in one year does not carry any probability of repeat funding the following year.</p>

**Youth Music Trailblazer Fund** **YOUTH MUSIC**


<p><b>Aims/priorities:</b></p>	<p>The funding aims to support young people who want to change their lives through music but cannot because of who they are, where they are from or what they are going through.</p> <p>The grants are for organisations who want to trial work for the first time, test a new way of working, or disrupt the status quo.</p>
<p><b>Who can apply?</b></p>	<p>Constituted UK based organisations may apply.</p> <p>To be eligible, applicants must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Be committed to improving equality, diversity, and inclusion (EDI) in their organisation, including youth voice and participation.</li> <li>• Be keen to develop their organisation.</li> <li>• Be legally constituted before submitting an application.</li> <li>• Have a bank account in the name of the organisation.</li> <li>• Have the correct insurance in place and comply with all relevant statutory legislation.</li> <li>• Have a safeguarding policy that is reflected on and updated regularly.</li> </ul> <p>There is particular interest in:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Small organisations with a turnover of less than £500,000 per annum, have a small staff team and limited fundraising capacity.</li> <li>• Those who work with children and young people facing barriers who want to trial a new music offer.</li> <li>• Established organisations that want to test a new way of working or disrupt the status quo.</li> </ul>
<p><b>Grant amount:</b></p>	<p>Two levels of grants are available:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Grants of £2,000 to £15,000 are available to organisations of less than one year old.</li> <li>• Grants of £2,000 to £30,000 are available to organisations of more than one year old.</li> </ul>

	Projects should last between 6 and 24 months.

## PEOPLE/COMMUNITIES EXPERIENCING RACIAL INEQUALITIES

<p>Hilden Charitable Fund</p>	
<p><b>Aims/priorities:</b></p>	<p>Hilden provides funding to organisations which demonstrate charitable purposes and awards grants to projects both in the UK and in specific developing countries (Malawi, Tanzania and Uganda).</p> <p>In the UK, most funding goes to registered charities. Overseas projects will either work with a UK charity or show relevant legal status.</p> <p>The aim of the Fund is to address disadvantage, notably by supporting causes which are unlikely to raise funds from public subscriptions. Both the UK and overseas fund policy is directed largely at supporting work at community level.</p> <p>The UK funding is for activities which fall under one of two programme areas:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Asylum Seekers and Refugees</b> - For organisations working to provide essential services which help meet the needs of asylum seekers and refugees and support their integration/participation in the wider community.</li> <li>• <b>Penal Affairs</b> - for work "through the door" where organisations go into prisons with projects and support to help prisoners (especially women) cope and/or maintain family bonds and to be better able to resettle positively when released. Post-release projects which support positive settlement and reduce the risk of re-offending are also welcomed.</li> </ul>
<p><b>Who can apply?</b></p>	<p>Applications will be accepted from:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Registered charities.</li> <li>• Charitable Incorporated Organisations (CIOs).</li> <li>• Community Interest Companies (CICs) limited by guarantee, not by shares.</li> <li>• Charitable Companies (must be registered both as a charity and a company)</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Excepted charities (see <a href="#">Excepted charities - GOV.UK</a> for more information on these)</li> </ul> <p>To be eligible for UK funding, charities that are registered and operating in the UK must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Have a project that meets the Foundation's priority areas.</li> <li>• Have a total annual income (from all sources) of under £250,000 in the last three financial years.</li> <li>• Be able to demonstrate UK charitable purposes.</li> <li>• Have adequate insurance and safeguarding policies and procedures for your service users, volunteers and employees, including DRB screening if necessary.</li> <li>• Hold less than 12 months spending in cash reserves</li> </ul>
<b>Grant amount:</b>	Grants of up to £7,000

<b>Equality and Human Rights Commission – Legal Support Scheme</b>	
<b>Aims/priorities:</b>	<p>Grants are available to legal representatives and not-for-profit advice providers to provide legal support to individuals who may have experienced racial discrimination in England, Scotland, or Wales. Funding is intended to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Improve access to justice for victims of racial discrimination</li> <li>• Ensure those regulated by the Commission know their duties, understand the consequences of not meeting those duties, and take action to improve their practice</li> <li>• Identify strategic matters that can be taken forward outside of this scheme to achieve wider positive change</li> </ul>
<b>Who can apply?</b>	<p>Applications are accepted from legal representatives acting for individuals in need of funding to pursue their case. This includes legal representatives providing advice or casework in the not-for-profit sector.</p>
<b>Grant amount:</b>	<p>Funding is at the discretion of the Commission</p>
<b>Application process:</b>	<p>An application form can be downloaded from the website</p>

<p><b>Armed Forces Families Fund: Early Years Programme</b></p>	 <p><b>THE ARMED FORCES COVENANT FUND TRUST</b></p>
<p><b>Aims/priorities:</b></p>	<p>The funding is intended to help Armed Forces families access good quality early childhood education and childcare provision that is located close to where they are living or serving.</p>
<p><b>Who can apply?</b></p>	<p>There are two ways to apply for a grant under this programme.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Single Applications: Settings with 50% or more Service children on roll for the duration of the project can apply as a single application.</li> <li>• Groups or Clusters: Setting with less than 50% Service children on roll may apply as part of a 'cluster'. This would include working with at least one more eligible setting in the area, which also has small numbers of Service children on roll. For a 'cluster' application, one nursery setting, or the local authority, would need to be the lead applicant.</li> </ul> <p>Applicant organisations must be based and registered in the UK, be a registered charity, a CIC, or a company limited by guarantee, or a local authority in one of the four countries of the UK.</p> <p>Single applications will be accepted from:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Early childhood education and childcare providers operating where Armed Forces families live or work and must offer group-based childcare and have at least 50% of Service children on roll.</li> <li>• Local authorities who wish to supply specific training to early childhood education and childcare providers supporting Service children aged 0-5 years.</li> <li>• An appropriately constituted organisation which provides training for setting staff to support Service children.</li> </ul> <p>They must be registered with, and inspected by, one of the following.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Ofsted (England)</li> <li>• Care Inspectorate (Scotland)</li> <li>• Care Inspectorate (Wales)</li> <li>• Early Years Teams within Health and Social Care Trusts (Northern Ireland)</li> </ul>

	<p>Settings with less than 50% Service children on roll could apply as a cluster by submitting a group bid on behalf of two or more setting with smaller numbers of Service children.</p> <p>Those forming a cluster can apply for:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Staff training with an Armed Forces focus.</li> <li>• Funding for a shared resource, such as a roving Armed Forces Early Years Support Worker.</li> </ul> <p>Applications will also be considered from private limited companies that have been registered, and been working in the Early Years sector, for at least three years.</p>
<b>Grant amount:</b>	Grants of £5,000 to £50,000 are available for projects lasting up to two years.
<b>Application process:</b>	Online application form
<b>Deadline:</b>	<p>There will be two application rounds:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The deadline for round 1 is 24 July 2024 (<b>12 noon</b>)</li> <li>• The deadline for round 2 is 20 November 2024 (12 noon)</li> </ul>

<b>Aims/priorities:</b>	<p>The foundation makes grants to projects which support young people (16 years and under) who are challenged by abuse or addiction, who are young carers, or who are homeless/without a safe place to call home.</p>
<b>Who can apply?</b>	<p>Applications will be considered from organisations who require funding in the areas of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Abuse</li> <li>• Addiction</li> <li>• Child carers</li> <li>• Homelessness</li> </ul> <p>Organisations must have a turnover of under £1.5 million and be supporting young people aged 16 years and under.</p>
<b>Grant amount:</b>	<p>Project grants of up to £2,500 are available.</p> <p>Shine Bright grants of up to £1,500 are available.</p> <p>Social Impact grants of up to £1,500 are available.</p>

<b>Woodward Charitable Trust - General Grants</b>	
<b>Aims/priorities:</b>	<p>The funding is for charitable organisations in the UK, to support core costs in the following areas:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Children and young people (up to 25 years) who are isolated, at risk of exclusion or involved in antisocial behaviour.</b> This covers gang violence and knife crime, education and mentoring, as well as projects that work to raise self-esteem and employment opportunities and encourage an active involvement in and contribution towards the local community.</li> <li>• <b>Disadvantaged families.</b> This covers parenting support and guidance, mental health, food poverty, refugees and domestic violence projects.</li> <li>• <b>Prisoners and ex-offenders</b> and specifically projects that maintain and develop contact with prisoners' families and help with the rehabilitation and resettlement of prisoners and/or ex-offenders after their release.</li> </ul>
<b>Who can apply?</b>	UK registered charities, charitable incorporated organisations, community interest companies and exempt charities can apply. Organisations must have an annual turnover of less than £200,000.

<p><b>Rees Jeffreys Road Fund</b></p>	 <p>Rees Jeffreys Road Fund</p>
<p><b>Aims/priorities:</b></p>	<p>The funding is to support the Fund’s objectives which are to foster improvements in the engineering, management, design and use of roads to deliver safer, more environmentally sensitive, more aesthetically pleasing and more enjoyable outcomes.</p> <p>The focus of the Fund is on the provision, use and enjoyment of roads in the UK (including Northern Ireland). Grant applications may include other forms of transport or mobility where this is relevant to, and integrated with, the use of roads.</p> <p>The trustees currently favour:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Proposals which have national rather than local significance.</li> <li>• Those which involve other funding partners, unless the application is for a very small amount of funding.</li> <li>• Innovative topics and ideas, which are not already being researched or worked on elsewhere, and which will add to the UK’s knowledge or ability to provide safe, sustainable and enjoyable roads.</li> <li>• Projects that have buy-in from appropriate stakeholders or decision makers, or a strong plan for how such buy-in will be achieved.</li> <li>• Projects which can support tangible change or improvements within a 24-month period.</li> </ul>
<p><b>Who can apply?</b></p>	<p>Eligible applicants include: charities, trusts, universities, agencies, academics, students or researchers based in the United Kingdom with an interest in roads and/or transportation.</p> <p>Universities and other academic institutions may apply for funding for research projects, parts of research projects or PhD funding under the normal grant process. Applications for funding to support study of a PhD should be submitted by the university</p>

	or place of study, in conjunction with the student, using the Fund's standard grant application.
<b>Grant amount:</b>	Up to 30,000
<b>Application process:</b>	<p>There is a two-stage application process.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The first step is to contact the Secretary at <a href="mailto:secretary@reesjeffreys.co.uk">secretary@reesjeffreys.co.uk</a> to register their interest. This should be done at least six weeks before the deadline for full applications. Details can be found in the guidance notes.</li> <li>• Applicants with a successful proposal will be invited to submit a full application. The Secretary will send the full application form and the guidance notes.</li> </ul>

Lancashire Environmental Fund	LANCASHIRE ENVIRONMENTAL FUND
<b>Aims/priorities:</b>	The funding is intended for a wide variety of projects to improve the environment and bring community benefits throughout the county of Lancashire.
<b>Who can apply?</b>	<p>Any not-for-profit organisation, charity trust, community group, voluntary organisation, town or parish council can apply.</p> <p>Organisations do not need to be registered as an Environmental Body (EB) with Entrust as the Fund will take on this role for the organisation. Organisation's registered as an EB will be expected to take on this role.</p> <p>Projects must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Be within 10 miles of a licensed landfill site.</li> <li>• Have long-term management arrangements where relevant.</li> <li>• Have full public access (Entrust minimum requirements are four evenings or two days every week, 104 days a year).</li> <li>• Be located within the Lancashire County Boundary, but excluding Blackpool and Blackburn with Darwen unitary authorities.</li> </ul>
<b>Grant amount:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Main Grants of up to £30,000 (up to 75% of costs). Overall project costs should not exceed £400,000.</li> <li>• Green Grants - up to £1,000 (applications received up until November 2024 and projects must be completed by March 2025).</li> </ul>
