Aims/priorities:	The funding is intended to help Armed Forces families access good quality early childhood education and childcare provision that is located close to where they are living or serving.	
Aims/priorities: Who can apply?	 There are two ways to apply for a grant under this programme. Single Applications: Settings with 50% or more Service children on roll for the duration of the project can apply as a single application. Groups or Clusters: Setting with less than 50% Service children on roll may apply as part of a 'cluster'. This would include working with at least one more eligible setting in the area, which also has small numbers of Service children on roll. For a 'cluster' application, one nursery setting, or the local authority, would need to be the lead applicant. Applicant organisations must be based and registered in the UK, be a registered charity, a CIC, or a company limited by guarantee, or a local authority in one of the four countries of the UK. Single applications will be accepted from: Early childhood education and childcare providers operating where Armed Forces families live or work and must offer group-based childcare and have at least 50% of Service children on roll. Local authorities who wish to supply specific training to early childhood education and childcare providers supporting Service children aged 0-5 years. An appropriately constituted organisation which provides 	
	training for setting staff to support Service children. They must be registered with, and inspected by, one of the following. Ofsted (England) Care Inspectorate (Scotland) Care Inspectorate (Wales) Early Years Teams within Health and Social Care Trusts (Northern Ireland)	

	Settings with less than 50% Service children on roll could apply as a cluster by submitting a group bid on behalf of two or more setting with smaller numbers of Service children. Those forming a cluster can apply for: Staff training with an Armed Forces focus. Funding for a shared resource, such as a roving Armed Forces Early Years Support Worker. Applications will also be considered from private limited companies that have been registered, and been working in the Early Years sector, for at least three years.

- Innovative topics and ideas, which are not already being researched or worked on elsewhere, and which will add to the UK's knowledge or ability to provide safe, sustainable and enjoyable roads.
- Projects that have buy-in from appropriate stakeholders or decision makers, or a strong plan for how such buy-in will be achieved.
- Projects which can support tangible change or improvements within a 24-month period.

Who can apply?

Eligible applicants include: charities, trusts, universities, agencies, academics, students or researchers based in the United Kingdom with an interest in roads and/or transportation.

Universities and other academic institutions may apply for funding for research projects, parts of research projects or PhD funding under the normal grant process. Applications for funding to support study of a PhD should be submitted by the university


