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1) Introduction

Salford's Locality Plan remains at the heart of the Third Sector Fund, with grants designed to improving the health and wellbeing of Salford's residents remains by utilising the strength of the city's vibrant VCSE sector.

After two years dominated by the Covid-19 pandemic, Salford CVS was keen to see the Third Sector Fund firmly focused on its core function of delivering positive health and wellbeing outcomes as articulated in the Locality Plan. This has been reflected in the breakdown of the fund into individual grants schemes (see p.13). This includes the **Impact Fund** which is designed to help tackle health inequalities (informed by Core20PLUS5), launched in quarter 4.

As agreed with lead Commissioner, the **Food Response Fund** was retained, to support the city's network of food banks and clubs. The significant rise in demand for food support seen during the pandemic has not abated, but has significantly increased as the cost-of-living crisis has taken hold.

The flexible nature of the Third Sector Fund enabled Salford CVS to establish the **Winter Support Fund**, which assisted 21 VCSE organisations remain open and meet additional demand during the coldest months of 2022/23.

At the request of the Commissioner, a new bespoke fund was established to support the installation of up to 10 **defibrillators in community settings**.

The Third Sector Fund has enabled Salford CVS to provide **235 awards** during 2022/23 to deliver community-led responses to health challenges across the city. This grant programme been backed up by the **wrap-around support** for the sector by provided by Salford CVS' development, finance, administration teams and senior leadership.

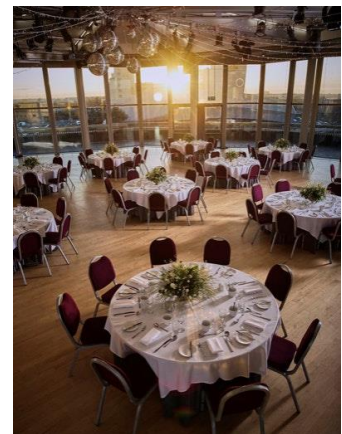
2.2) Narrative reporting and feedback received

Salford's VCSE sector comprises 1,665* community groups, charities, and social enterprises working across the city for the benefit of local people. With almost 1,000 members, Salford CVS has significant reach into those communities most in need. Whether directly responding to Salford's health and wellbeing priorities. or addressing the wider determinants of health, the 235 awards made possible by Third Sector Fund during 2022/23, have helped enhance the lives of thousands of residents.

Youth Wellbeing Fund

Launched in February 2022, the Youth Wellbeing Fund straddled two financial years. In addition to the allocation from the Third Sector Fund, £15,000 of financial support was provided by TalkTalk, who were keen to support the wellbeing of Salford's young people in the wake of Covid.

In May, over £60,000 was allocated to 16 VCSE organisations, schools or colleges.

Healthy Schools Partnership Challenge

In July, awards of almost £150,000 were made from the Third Sector Fund to support 12 partnerships of VCSE organisations and Primary Schools to deliver a range of health and wellbeing projects over the 2022-23 academic year.

Delivery of these projects was only just commencing at the end of Q2 with the start of the new academic year. Selected quotes from successful projects demonstrate the interest and drive in supporting the health and wellbeing of primary age children in Salford.

"We're looking forward to starting our new Health Schools Partnership Challenge Project this Sept with Deans Primary School and RSPB (Royal Society Protection Bird). The school has a huge area of greenspace that covers 2 acres. This offers a significant opportunity for connecting pupils, staff, and families with therapeutic nature-based activities that boost wellbeing, physical and mental health, and bring the community together to tackle related issues such as social isolation."

Winter Support Fund

In Q3, Salford CVS responded to the rise in energy and wider costs, combined with increase in need, to create the Winter Support Fund. These grants enabled charities that owned or leased buildings to maintain their services over the winter months providing essential services to those most in need.



Defibrillator Fund

This fund was established at the request of NHS Salford ICP to further develop Salford's network of community defibrillators. With awards of up to £2,500 available for purchase, installation and training of staff and volunteers. St John's Ambulance were the chosen supplier of both the defibrillator, box and training. All recipient organisations were required to register their new device on the national defibrillator network called the Circuit: <https://www.thecircuit.uk>

In November 2022, **City of Salford Schools FA** was awarded a grant of £2,500 through Salford CVS' Defibrillator Fund to purchase and install a defibrillator at The Pavilion at Lower Broughton Playing Fields.

With the grant, the club was also able to offer CPR and defibrillator training to ten volunteers and to reach out to and establish good relationships with the local Orthodox Jewish community.

Putting heart into volunteering

Irene is a female volunteer aged 79 from Irlam. She joined our club at Irlam in 2014 following a heart attack and was still grieving the sudden loss of her husband. The club gave her a new lease of life following retirement and she was able to make many new friends. She also introduced some of her own friends to the club and has helped us to grow and expand.

Soon after joining Irlam and Cadishead Healthy Heart Club, Irene agreed to help us by taking the register each week, and collected entrance fees as members arrived. She is also an excellent baker and cake decorator and has often baked cakes for Christmas and Easter raffles, thus supporting our fundraising efforts.

As the club continued to expand, Irene volunteered to support the Coordinator by helping to organise day trips and events. It was evident that she had excellent administration and organisation skills and was able to support our work by taking members bookings for trips and collects and accurately logs payments made by members.

Irene attends the club every Wednesday and Friday morning and does not expect reward or remuneration for her efforts. She says she sees the value in our work and gains great enjoyment and satisfaction from attending the club and our events. Her volunteer work helps to keep her mind stimulated and active. Irene was thrilled when she received an invitation to our celebration event and said it was rewarding to be recognised.

Food Response Fund

Since the emergence of Covid-19, Salford CVS has been working with Salford Foodshare Network to support the city's food banks and clubs.

The relationship with Salford Foodshare Network and the mechanism for fast-track investments to support essential food support were made possible by the ongoing commitment of NHS Salford CCG/ICP through the Third Sector Fund.

Food Response Fund – helping enable and motivate national monies via Salford Council

The Food Response Fund investments route has been utilised by Salford City Council to invest (via Salford CVS) £169,495 of Household Support Fund monies in the VCSE sector over quarters 1 & 2. A further £100k of the Household Support Fund will be channelled by Salford CVS to food banks and clubs in quarters 3 & 4.

Recognising volunteering

In June the Ladybird Fun Club used a £236 Volunteers' Week Activities Grants to provide certificates and a celebratory meal for their 13 volunteers who've worked tirelessly to offer children aged 5-11 the opportunity to make friends, develop confidence and learn new skills through arts, craft, gardening, drama, cooking and seasonal projects.

Coming together around musical themes

Connect Youth and Community Centre utilised a £1,000 Wellbeing Grant to entertain and engage their members over 3 sessions for up to 35 people. As the group stated: *"One person sharing or singing becomes a catalyst to others to have a go. Before long the venue is buzzing with laughing, happy people."*



Walking Football

The community group WFC Passed It brings together older people and people with dementia and their carers from all over Salford. A £900 Wellbeing Grants enabled the group to run a series of Walking Football sessions which culminated in a tournament and trophy giving in October 2022.

Parks for Health

Creating a Buzz in Salford

The year 2022/23 Islington Mill Foundation's Bee Corner project transformed a container unit on their garden and apiary site into a classroom. This enabled expansion of their calendar of events, and engagement with more people, to become a hub for beekeeping experience and education in Salford. It was supported by a 'Big Ideas' grant (utilising Third Sector Fund from 2021/22).



3) Summary of Awarded Grants by Fund 2022/23

a) Impact Fund – Health Inequalities

A total of £240,000 has been allocated to support impactful projects aligned with the Salford Locality Plan priorities and NHS England's Core20PLUS5 priorities. This was launched in Q4 and is due to be awarded in Q1 2023/24.

b) Food Response Fund

This fund was first established by Salford CVS and Salford Foodshare Network in 2020 as a response to the spike in demand on food banks and clubs. Since then Salford CVS and FSN have continued to channel TSF and other monies to food banks and clubs to help meet with greatly increased demands. Investments are proportionate to the number of weekly beneficiaries and cost of culturally appropriate food.

In just wanted to drop you a quick note to say a massive thank you to you for awarding us a discretionary grant of £500 so that we can provide period products for young people using our Project Smile Project.

All the children attending our project have complex physical and learning disabilities and the majority have social care needs. The children are disadvantaged in numerous ways including through ill health, through complex disabilities, poverty, caring responsibilities, safeguarding issues, parental ill health, large, chaotic families, or poor housing. Many of the children we support live in families comprising of 12-15 children. The young women we are supporting are not only affected by all of these issues but are now dealing with puberty and periods too. They have a limited understanding of what this means and have no access to period products as their families are struggling to afford the basics.

We have explored the idea of buying period pants – as I think these will afford young women a higher degree of dignity and independence. Thanks to your grant this is now possible.
