## 1) Introduction

**Salford's Locality Plan** remains at the heart of the Third Sector Fund, with grants designed to improve the health and wellbeing of Salford's residents by utilising the strength of the city's vibrant VCSE sector.

After two years dominated by the COVID-19 pandemic, Salford CVS was keen to see the Third Sector Fund firmly focus on its core function of delivering positive health and wellbeing outcomes as articulated in the Locality Plan. This has been reflected in the breakdown of the fund into individual grants pots, including the Impact Fund, which awarded grants to 20 VCSE organisations to help address the health inequalities identified in NHS England's Core20PLUS5.

As in previous years the demand for food support across the city was high, with over £100k being channelled into food response activities. Salford CVS also supported local organisations that own or lease a community venue to apply to the Department of Health and Social Care's AED Fund, resulting in more life-saving devices being installed across the city.

In September, Salford CVS celebrated the achievements and impact of the Third Sector Fund at a showcase event at The Lowry Theatre. Over 100 guests joined us for an afternoon which highlighted the increasingly important work of Salford's VCSE sector in supporting the health and wellbeing of our communities.

The Third Sector Fund enabled Salford CVS to provide 225 awards in 2023/24 to support community-led responses to health challenges across the city. Grant recipients also benefitted from wrap-around support from our Development, Finance, Administration and Senior Leadership Teams, depending on their unique circumstances and requirements.

#### Narrative reporting and feedback received


Salford's VCSE sector comprises 1,665\* community groups, charities, and social enterprises working across the city for the benefit of local people. With over 1,000 members, Salford CVS has significant reach into those communities most in need.

Whether directly responding to Salford's health and wellbeing priorities, or addressing the wider determinants of health, the 225 awards made possible by the Third Sector Fund in 2023/24 have helped enhance the lives of thousands of residents.

## **Big Ideas Fund: Investing in Salford**

Delivered in 2022/23; evaluation in 2023/24

Launched in early 2022, the Big Ideas Fund distributed grants of up to £25,000 to voluntary, community and social enterprise (VCSE) sector organisations for transformative projects designed to create lasting change in Salford. The fund offered the VCSE sector an opportunity to invest in resources that would continue to benefit their organisation and community for many years to come or to pilot an innovative project linked to Salford's 'Great Eight' priorities. Social, economic and environmental sustainability had to be at the heart of their big idea.

The 20 funded projects ran from April 2022 to March 2023 and focused on the following three priorities:

- HEALTHIER Addressing health and wellbeing in line with Salford's Locality Plan.
- **FAIRER** Tackling poverty and inequality in Salford.
- **GREENER** Improvements to energy, transport, water, waste, biodiversity to benefit our local (and global) environment.

During Q1/Q2 Salford CVS collated project reporting and produced an Impact Report on the Big Ideas Fund. This information on spend, outcomes, impact, and learning, was compiled and analysed by Grants Development Workers. <u>Read the full report here (PDF).</u>



#### Key outcomes from Big Ideas Fund reporting





#### HEALTHIER

A number of grant recipients reported improvements in people's fitness, diets, and understanding of what constitutes a healthy lifestyle. Many grant recipients reported improvements in people's emotional wellbeing, confidence, and friendships/social connections.

#### FAIRER

Two organisations reported improvements in beneficiaries' employability skills and knowledge of how to access employment. Two organisations supported beneficiaries to secure paid work.

#### GREENER

At least nine organisations conducted infrastructure work that will increase capacity to deliver green and growing projects in Salford. Many organisations increased the biodiversity at their sites by planting a wide range of plants and flowers.

### Impact Fund 2023: Tackling Health Inequalities

In June 2023, the Impact Fund awarded grants of up to £20,000 to well-established VCSE organisations to deliver evidence-driven projects of up to 12 months in duration, aimed at addressing health inequalities in Salford.

Proposals have been funded that address the priorities identified in NHS England's Core20PLUS5 tackling health inequalities approach and how they translate to Salford's health priorities, as articulated in the Salford Locality Plan for health and care.

Twenty awards were made to the value of £346,881.90 and projects are to run from July 2023 – June 2024. With support from



GDWs, projects are using evaluation frameworks and tools to ensure health and wellbeing impacts are being measured and to capture learning about their chosen approaches.

**Case study** from Flowhesion Foundation's BAMER Eccles Health Hub Funded through the Impact Fund 2023/24

## **Developing skills for life**

In June 2023, Flowhesion Foundation was awarded a grant of £18,460.00 to deliver the holistic 'Eccles BAMER Health Hub' project. The project offers a wide range of support, including 'Mind, body, soul' classes, which aim to educate, empower, and apply self-care techniques in participants daily lives; yoga and chair-based exercise sessions; a free counselling service; and Mums and Tots stay and play sessions. All services are bilingual and based at accessible venues in the Eccles.

Ariel has been attending the Mums and Tots group with her 17-month year old son, Aiden, since 2023. Ariel and Aiden recently migrated to the UK, which means Aiden has not had as much social interaction with family or friends as another toddler might have at his age and he can be quite shy in social situations.



Flowhesion Foundation's EYFS practitioner has worked hard with Aiden, introducing him to a range of activities that allow him to engage with other toddlers as part of a group activity. This has helped develop his communication, language, and emotional development skills, as per the EYFS framework. For example, he has taken part in a sand tray activity with other toddlers, where he hid small animals and numbers, assisted by Mum. Aiden has also been supported to work on his expressive, creative, and artistic skills, by taking part in drawing, colouring, modelling, and painting.



Our EYFS practitioner has observed that Aiden is becoming more comfortable in social situations with other toddlers his age. For example, during nursery rhyme circles he is more engaged in trying to pronounce simple words, and he looks at Mum a lot less during group activities. Ariel also feels that her son has benefitted from attending the

group and that he is more confident, and his communication and sensory skills are developing well. Ariel has also expressed she is grateful for the healthy snacks available to Aiden and the other children during sessions.

## **Small Grants**

The small awards supported by the Third Sector Fund enable a great diversity of health and wellbeing activity to take place across the city. A few examples are given below.

#### a) Chatty benches

David from Friends of Peel Park was interviewed to find out more about their 'chatty benches' project, which was funded by the panel to provide a more permanent 'chatty bench' location, to encourage social interaction in Salford's green spaces, and help fight loneliness.

#### b) New Beginnings in Walkden

New Beginnings Project were awarded a grant of £1,500 to extend their provision and support in Salford, to establish a Women's Social Group for women in Walkden and Little Hulton. The group meets twice per month, utilising Walkden Gateway, and brings together women of all ages, providing support, activities, and social interaction.



"Activities change on a weekly basis and are based on improving wellbeing such as arts and crafts, mindfulness activities, a fun quiz, singing songs and generally having fun, laughing and opening up discussions about topics that they may want to talk about for example their health or tips on saving money." #### c) Cheers to volunteers!

In May 2023, Dancing with Dementia were awarded £500 from the Volunteers' Week Activities Fund.

"Dancing with Dementia invited 40 volunteers to celebrate our very successful year. The party atmosphere was certainly evident with the fun, laughter and of course the dancing!"

The Volunteers' Week Activities Fund awarded 25 groups grants to celebrate, recruit, or retain volunteers over May and June 2023, to the sum of £10,295.45.



## Lifesaving support

Patricroft Community Centre was awarded a grant of £1,500 to support them to apply to the Department of Health and Social Care (DHSC)'s <u>AED Fund</u>. The grant covered the cost of the match funding required by the DHSC, as well as providing a contribution to installation, training, and ongoing running costs.

"We had previously considered purchasing [a defibrillator] as the community centre is a hub of activity. Cost had been the barrier to us getting one, this opportunity to get one with an external cabinet means the resource is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week."



## Every day's a school day

In May 2023 Salford CVS launched the Healthy Schools Partnership Challenge, which awarded 12 grants totalling £148,081.52. The fund offers grants of up to £15,000 for partnership projects involving at least one Salford primary school and at least one VCSE organisation, who work together to deliver activities that improve the health and wellbeing of primary school children.



In November 2023, Ella Bulbeck, Grants Coordinator, paid a visit to Take Action Together's Healthy Schools Partnership Challenge project which is based at Wardley Hall in Worsley. The project aims to improve local children's confidence and self-esteem by developing their communication and teamwork skills in a safe, nurturing woodland environment. <u>Read the blog</u> on our website.

#### **Feeding Salford**

Over the 2023/24 financial year, Salford CVS made 21 investments totalling £104,000.00 to groups and organisations to support their vital work feeding some of Salford's most vulnerable residents. These awards can be spent on food and supplies for the food club/bank/pantry and wider food and cost of living support work.

When asked about the difference Food Response Fund awards made in 2022/23, recipient organisations were unanimous about the impact:

"The previous grant enabled us to continue supporting the homeless community and support persons experiencing food poverty. Our seven evening a week drop-in offers hot food, respite, showers and support. The grant allowed us to continue the food service and purchase nutritious foods for our chef to cook. We were also able to purchase some new equipment and replace a broken freezer. This has been invaluable to our service in allowing us to store fresh foods.

"The food response grant has made a massive difference on our service and that of the service users. The cost-of-living crisis is having a massive effect on many people, especially those that find themselves in situations such as the families we support. Salford Women's Aid provides a vital service to the most vulnerable members of the community, and the support we receive from Salford CVS is very much appreciated by the staff team and our service users." When asked what difference this grant would make, the following response was received:

"We are consistently operating at capacity, but over the past 6 months we have seen a rise in demand for our services, plus an increase in the complexity of issues faced by the people we support. Being able to offer a hot meal to those who access services at Rainbow Haven will support improved emotional and physical health and wellbeing. Social and communal sharing of food encourages people to access other Rainbow Haven services and start to build safe, happy, productive lives in the UK.

Many of the people we support are either destitute or struggling financially. They often do not yet have the right to work or are unemployed, due to multiple barriers for example language, or trauma related mental health issues. They may be in contingency accommodation or a room without cooking facilities. A hot meal at Rainbow Haven may be their only hot meal of the day. Small groups in Salford would not be able to keep going without your help. Thank you Salford CVS."

#### **Case study** from King Square Library's book library project Funded through the Wellbeing Fund 2022/23

## Inspiring the next generation of readers

Kings Square Library was founded in 2021, in response to feedback from people in the Orthodox Jewish community that they were bored, isolated and in need of suitable forms of entertainment as a result of the COVID-19 and fears about attending events or other inperson activities.

The library received a grant of £1,000 in September 2023 to purchase 50 new books on a range of topics and genres. Jewish books are more expensive and the library struggles to keep their shelves stocked with new and exciting titles. This grant allowed the library to diversify their selection, including purchasing new children's books, to keep their members engaged and to ensure no one is turned away because all the books are out on loan.

Kings Square Library has supported people to come together to discuss the books, which has achieved positive health and wellbeing outcomes for the people involved including making new friendships, improved reading and literacy skills, improved confidence and self-esteem, and re-engaging with and being more active in the community following the covid-19 pandemic.

The library has a number of volunteers on their books, who carry out key tasks including administration, book binding, and supporting members to borrow books. This has allowed them to develop their employability skills and improve their mental wellbeing by connecting with others and giving back to the community.

"The library has been successful beyond our expectations. There is no other library servicing our community offering culturally appropriate services after school hours and ever since we launched, we have been inundated with requests to join the library. We now have over 260 member families, many of which include six to ten children. This means we need to regularly top up the books we have available so we have a wide range to suit the tastes and interests of the community and to ensure we don't have to turn anyone away."

## Showcasing the impact of the Third Sector Fund

On Thursday 14<sup>th</sup> September 2023, Salford CVS hosted an event at The Lowry Theatre to showcase the impact of the Third Sector Fund on Salford's VCSE sector and diverse communities.

The event was well attended, with a turnout of almost 100 colleagues, grant beneficiaries, and supporters from NHS Salford ICP, the wider health system, Salford City Council and VCSE organisation of all sizes.

A welcome was delivered by Cllr Sharmina August followed by a 'Long View' of Salford CVS' ICP funding from Alison Page, CEO at Salford CVS. Harry Golby, Associate Director of Delivery and Transformation, NHS Salford ICP highlighted the role of the Third Sector Fund in achieving measurable impact and social return on investment.



Several TSF-funded VCSE sector organisations spoke about their projects that had been made possible through the Third Sector Fund, and the vital support that it has provided for the health and wellbeing of Salfordians. David Keane from **BASIC** told the event about the incredible developments that their Big Ideas Fund project (2022-2023) has enabled – an electric vehicle to transport beneficiaries with brain, spinal, and mobility issues to and from key appointments. Other speakers from Salford Foodshare Network, Flowhesion Foundation, Talk About it Mate, The Rio Ferdinand Foundation, and Incredible Education also shared the impact of their funding on the health and wellbeing of their communities – from supporting Asian mothers in Eccles, to the physical health of school children, to the development of new forest education workshop facilities.




## **Bringing Salford Together**

## Feeback on the Third Sector Fund

When asked 'What difference they feel the Third Sector Fund has made to the health and wellbeing of communities in Salford?', guests stated:







#### b) Food Response Fund

This fund was first established by Salford CVS and Salford Foodshare Network (SFN) in 2020 as a response to the spike in demand on food banks and clubs. Since then, a proportion of Salford Council's Household Support Fund (HSF) allocation has been channelled via Salford CVS to food banks and clubs to help meet the rise in demand.

The HSF monies has enabled Salford CVS to allocate Food Response Fund monies to wider VCSE food response activities where funding support is limited.
